The culture and people of Tibet have long been a source of fascination as well as inspiration around the globe. Yet the Tibetans are human beings like the rest of mankind, and in modern times they have faced their share of difficulties in maintaining their ancient heritage in an adequate and dignified way.

ASIA Onlus, the Association for International Solidarity in Asia, is a Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO) founded in December 1988 through the determination and the commitment of a group of scholars of tibetan culture; ASIA in cooperation with **Tibet Heritage Fund** and **Cicsene**, has launched a program to investigate the issues of sustainable preservation of the heritage of Tibet. In particular, this program seeks to evaluate adequate methodologies to preserve aspects such as Tibet's ancient architecture, its traditional cities and its monastic art.

A number of activities launched under this program as a cooperation between ASIA, THF and CICSENE include seminars and exhibitions in Italy and Germany, and publications of the results.

THE SEMINARS

The seminars will bring experts of various fields relating to the topics of sustainable development and preservation of art and architecture together for a discussion.

The seminars will be hosted by Universities and Conservation Institute in Napoli, Torino and Roma, and will be open to the public. The proceedings will be published in print and online.

Conservation of Tibetan wall-paintings

Roma, 22.6

Technical aspects of conservation of Tibetan wall-paintings will be the main focus. Paintings on the interior walls of monuments, monasteries and residences in Tibet present a significant part of Tibetan cultural heritage. The earliest surviving paintings date back to at least the 11th century, and point to the strong Indian influence on the early development of Tibetan culture and religion. Events of the Cultural Revolution have greatly diminished the number of preserved historic monuments, so that the preservation of the remaining examples of early art and architecture has assumed great importance.

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
